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## Rose Gold

## Romance Necklace

This Rose Gold Romance Necklace is a truly stunning DIY necklace that will have you looking fantastic every time you wear it. The gorgeous pattern in this handmade necklace will leave everyone believing you bought it!


## Materials

(2) \#7723501-6pc 11\&8mm Crystazzi OvalCrystal
(2) \#7723101-7pc 9X6mm Crystazzi OvalCrystal
\#3949419-1pc 18" Link Chain- Rose Gold Plate
\#71369072-25pc 35mm Eye Pin- Rose Gold Plate
\#71369036-10pc 9mm Filigree Bead CapRose Gold Plate
\#71369044-10pc $8 \times 3.5 \mathrm{~mm}$ Antique Wheel Spacer- Rose Gold Plate
\#71369038-10pc 6X4.5mm Squish FiligreeRose Gold Plate
\#3949466-1 Set 10 mm Band Accent ToggleRose Gold Plate
\#71369065-4pc 25X29mm Filigree Chandelier- Rose Gold Plate \#3949425-38pc 2X3mm Rose Gold Crimp Bead

## Instructions

1. Cut six 1 -inch and one $2-1 / 2$-inch lengths of chain.
2. Make the four 8 mm pearl links and the four bead caps/10mm pearl links, Thread the bead(s) onto an eye pin and form a loop.
3. Link the chain and beaded links together as shown in the illustration. Attach one end of the chain/links to the chandelier using a jump ring.

## Instructions (cont.)

4. Attach the other end of the chain/links to the bar end of the toggle using a jump ring. Connect the round toggle end to a chandelier using a jump ring.
5. Cut a 7 -inch and an 11 -inch length of beading wire.
6. Use a Crimp tube to attach the 7inch wire to the inside loop of a chandelier. Thread the bead pattern onto the wire (use the smaller ovals). Use a crimp tube to attach the wire to the inside loop of the other chandelier.
7. Make the 10 oval beaded links (use the larger ovals). Link them together and attach the ends to the center links of the chandeliers.
8. Use a crimp tube to attach the 11inch wire to the outside loop of a chandelier. Thread the bead pattern onto the wire (use the smaller ovals). Use a crimp tube to attach the beading wire to the outside loop of the other chandelier.


# Gorgeous Pearl Pendant 

## By Gloria from Domestic Diva

You will not be able to resist making this super stunning DIY necklace. Not only is this pearl pendant going to catch everybody's eyes, but it's also going to make you feel like a queen!


## Materials

18 gauge round wire
Half-hard, half-round 20 gauge wire
30-5mm, 18 gauge jump rings
Swarovski cream pearl 12 mm

Jewelry pliers
Wire cutters
Permanent marker
Masking tape
Two 3mm cream seed pearls

## Instructions

1. Cut a piece of round wire to measure 5". Bend the wire in the center around a permanent marker. Use the marker to create a dot one inch from both ends.

Tip: Use alcohol to remove the permanent marker from the wire.
2. Slip 30 jump rings onto the wire you just made your markings on.


## Instructions (cont.)

3. Bend the wires over the marker at the dots. The curves should be facing away from the center of the pendant. Use round nose pliers to curl the wire ends.
4. Hold up the work and place a piece of masking tape on one wire above the rings. There should be the same amount of space between the rings and the end of the wire on the left and right.
5. Cut a piece of half round wire to measure 16 ". Wrap the end around the un-taped round wire twice. Bring the wire to the front of the work.

6. Add one seed pearl to the wire, the 12 mm pearl, and then add another seed pearl to the wire.
7. Remove the tape on the other ruond wire and wrap the hal round wire around that spot.


## Instructions (cont.)

8. Wrap up the half-round wrie toward the top.
9. When you reach the point where the two round wires meet, secure them together with two wraps then move downward, wrapping the bare round wire. When you reach the point where you started wrapping (above the rings), cut away the excess wire.

10.Cut another piece of half round wire to measure 4 ". Place the middle of the wire with the flat side against the spot below the center wraps. Fold the wires to the back of the work and bring them back to the front crossing each other.
10. Bring the wires down on both sides and wrap them twice between the large pearl and seed pearls. Cut off the excess wire.
11. Attach your pendant to the chain you either handmade or bought, and you are good to go!


## White Waterfall Pearl <br> Necklace

This White Waterfall Pearl Necklace really adds a new twist on a typical pearl jewelry piece. This is an undeniably stunning DIY necklace that will have heads turning your way every time you wear it!


## Materials

8mm Pearls
6 mm Faceted Beads
Headpins
Eye Pins

Chains
4-5mm Jump Rings
Clasp
Pliers
Flush or Wire Cutters (optional)

## Instructions

1. Pass a headpin into the bead and make a loop using round nose pliers, and wrap the headpin around to secure the loop.
2. Pass your main beads through an eye pin and repeat this same process.
3. Using jump rings connect the two pieces you created together.
4. Repeat these steps for all of your beads.
5. Join your beads to your necklace by opening each chain hole and passing your wrapped bead through it.
6. Join your beads to your chain, add a clasp and you're all done!

## Black Pearl Treasure Necklace

Talk about a twist on a gorgeous DIY necklace. This Black Pearl Treasure Necklace will really make you and your DIY jewelry stand out with it's unique design!


## Materials

1 pk \#34719059 145pc Starter Pack - Silver 1 pk \#34722017 158pc 6mm Black Pearl
1 pk \#7120503 27pc 14mm Glass Pearl Strand - Black

1 pk \#3202102 40' .45mm 7-Strand Bead Wire - Silver

1 pk \#7120303 41pc 10mm Round Pearl Strand-Black

1 pk \#34722018 90pc 8mm Black Pearl \#4501 Bead Crimping Pliers \#6854 Needle Nose Pliers and CutterPrecision Comfort
\#4477 Parrot Beak Memory Wire Cutter \#6858 Round Nose Pliers- Precision Comfort

## Instructions

1. Thread (2) 14 mm pearls onto a head pina nd form a loop.
2. Thread a 14 mm pearl onto a head pin and form a loop. Repeat this step to make four single bead drops.
3. Thread a 14 mm pearl and a 10 mm pearl onto a head pin and form a loop. Repeat this step to make two double bead drops.
4. Thread a 10 mm pearl onto the head pin and form a loop. Repeat this step to make three single bead drops.
5. Thread (2) 8 mm pearls onto an eye pin and form a loop. Repeat this step to make two double bead links.

## Instructions (cont.)

6. Thread a 6 mm pearl, an 8 mm pearl, and a 6 mm pearl onto an eye pin and form a loop. Repeat this step to make seven triple bead links.
7. Thread a 14 mm pearl onto an eye pin and form a loop. Repeat this step to make three single bead links.
8. Connect the following, in order: an 8 mm double bead link (from step 5), a 6 mm jump ring, and a single 10 mm bead drop (from step 4). Repeat this step to make two bead link strands.
9. Connect the following, in order: a triple bead link (from step 6), a 6 mm jump ring, and a single 14 mm bead drop (from step 2). Repeat this step to make a two bead link strands.
10. Connect the following, in order: a triple bead link (from step 6), a 6 mm jump ring, and a 14 mm single bead link (from step 7), and a 14 mm single bead drop (from step 2). Repeat this step to make two bead link strands.
11. Connect the following, in order: a triple bead link (from step 6), a 6 mm jump ring, a 14 mm single bead link (from step 7 ), and a 14 mm single bead drop (from step 2). Repeat this step to make two bead link strands.
12. Connect the following, in order: a triple bead link (from step 6), a 6 mm jump ring, a 14 mm single bead link (from step 7), and the 14 mm double bead link drop (from step 1) to make a single bead link strand.
13. Cut a 22 " length of beading wire
14. Using a crimp tube, attach one end of the beading wire to a lobster claw clasp.

## Instructions (cont.)

15. Thread on the following beads: (17) 6 mm pearls, (12) 8 mm pearls, the top loop of a bead link strand from step 8 , an 8 mm pearl, the top loop of a bead link strand from step 9, an 8 mm pearl, the top loop of a bead link strand from step 10, a 6 mm pearl, the top loop of a bead link strand from step 11 , a 6 mm pearl, the top loop of the bead link strand from step 12, a 6 mm pearl, the top loop of the other bead link strand from step 11 , a 6 mm pearl, the top loop of the other bead link strand from step 10, an 8 mm pearl, the top loop of the bead link strand from step 9, an 8 mm pearl, the top loop of the other bead link strand from step 8 , (12) 8 mm pearls, and (17) 6 mm pearls.
16. Using a crimp tube, attach the beading wire to a 6 mm jump ring and trim the excess wire.
17. Cut a $26^{\prime \prime}$ length of beading wire.
18. Using a crimp tube, attach the beading wire to the lobster claw clasp.
19. Thread on the following beads: (22) 6 mm pearls, (4) 8 mm pearls, (5) 10 mm pearls, the jump ring from the first bead link strand added in step 15 , a 10 mm pearl, the jump ring from the second bead link strand added in step 15, a 10 mm pearl, the jump ring of the third bead link strand added in step 15 , a 10 mm pearl, the jump ring of the fourth bead link strand added in step 15, a 10 mm pearl, the jump ring of the fifth bead link strand added in step 15 , a 10 mm pearl, the jump ring of the sixth bead link strand added in step 15 , a 10 mm pearl, the jump ring from the seventh bead link strand added in step 15, a 10 mm pearl, the jump ring from the eighth bead link strand added in step 15, a 10 mm pearl, the jump ring of the ninth jump ring strand added in step 15, (5) 10 mm pearls, (4) 8 mm pearls, and (22) 6 mm pearls.
20. Using a crimp tube, attach the beading wire to the 6 mm jump ring from step 16. 21. Cut a $13 / 4$ " length of extender chain. Attach the chain to the 6 mm jump ring from step 16 . Attach the loop of a 10 mm bead drop to the end of the extender chain.

# Stunning Ribbon and Pearl Bracelet 

## By Eileen from Yes Missy

This Stunning Ribbon and Pearl Bracelet is an insanely easy handmade bracelet pattern that you can make in just 5 -mintues. Now you have a unique and stunning DIY pearl bracelet that everyone will be jealous of!


## Materials

Approximately 20 inches of ribbon - this will vary depending on your wrist length, but it should be about 3 times the length of your wrist.
12 mm pearls
Stretch cord or stringing material.
A needle

## Instructions

1. Thread your stretch chord through your needle, (you may need a needle with a larger loop hole depending on the size of your stretch cord.) Then, sew through a fold of ribbon.
2. Thread the needle through the bead.
3. Then, thread the needle through another fold.
4. Repeat steps 2-3 until you have all of your beads strung.
5. Tie the ends of the cord ends together into a secure knot and tie the ribbon into a pretty bow.

## Pearl and Chains Fabric Bracelet

This Pearl and Chains Fabric Bracelet is a pretty twist on a typical pearl bracelet. Plus, this DIY bracelet is an Anthropologie knockoff


## Materials

Small amount of fabric (chiffon will be thinner and linen will be thicker)
Approximately 56, 5 mm pearls
Small chain, at least 88"
Needle
Matching thread

## Instructions

1. Begin cutting out the fabric for the bracelet. You'll need one long 2.5" X $15^{\prime \prime}$ piece and 2 smaller 2" X 5" pieces.
2. Find the centers of the long piece and one of the shorter pieces. Line them up with the shorter piece on the back of the longer piece. Tuck the ends under the pin them. This will stabilize the area that you sew the pearls to.
3. On the front of this section, draw out with a disappearing ink marker the lines that you are going to sew your pearls on. Stay 1/2" away from the edge, this will be part of the hem for later in the project.


## Instructions (cont.)

4. Begin sewing down your strands of pearls. Add the pearls for each row to your thread and sew them down.
5. Sew down the strand between each pearl also. This will help the strand to lay flat.
6. Continue to fill up the center section with rows of pearls.
7. Working on the back side of the bracelet, turn the raw edges over in 2 tiny folds and hand sew them down to create your hem.
8. Continue working your way around the bracelet until both slides are hemmed.
9. Now, we're going to work on the chain. Cut the short pieces for the sides next. You'll need 24, 2" pieces.
10. Lay out a longer piece of chain (at least $20^{\prime \prime \prime}$ ) to begin sewing down on the long side of the bracelet. Start sewing the chain to the bracelet 2" from the end of the chain.



## Instructions (cont.)

11.Evenly space out these shorter pieces and sew them on as you go, working your way down the side of the bracelet.

Note: Be sure to sew these smaller pieces on very well because they will have the most stress placed on them once you tie the bracelet.
12. When you get to the other end of the bracelt, but the chains so there is a 2 " piece that extends past the end of the fabric.
13. Repeat steps 10-12 to the other side of the bracelet. When you finish that you should end up with something that looks like this.
14. When you want to wear this bracelet all you have to do is tie the ends loosely and you're good to go!


## Grace Kelly Woven Bracelet

By Julie Bean from Beadaholique

Nothing says classy pearl bracelet like this stunning Grace Kelly Woven Bracelet. This DIY bracelet will make you feel like you are part of the royal family ever time you put it on! You will fall in love with this bracelet pattern's design.


## Materials

Swarovski Crystal, 5810 Round Faux Pearl Beads 8 mm , 25 pieces, White ( 1 pckg)

Swarovski Crystal, 5810 Round Faux Pearl Beads 3mm, 50 pieces, White (1 pckg)

NYMO Nylon Beading Thread Size D for Delica Beads Ivory 65YD (1 pckg)

Czech Seed Beads 11/0 Light Gold Supra Metallic (1 Hank) (1 pckg)
Czech Seed Beads Size 11/0 Antiqued Cream Pearl (1 Hank/4000 Beads) (I pckg)
1 Ounce Bar Beeswax Thread Strengthening Conditioner for beads/

## Instructions

1. We are going to make the body of the bracelet using the right angle weave stitch. Start by conditioning a 4-foot length of Nymo nylon beading thread, and thread your needle onto the thread.
2. String one size $11 / 0$ Czech seed bead in light gold supra metallic, one size 11/0 Czech seed bead in antique cream pearl, one size 11/0 Czech seed bead in light gold supra metallic, and one size 11/0 Czech seed bead in antique cream pearl. Create your first unit of four beads with these beads. Pick up more beads and right angle weave a total of eight units. Some bead weaving instructions refer to these sections as unit columns. You want to end with eight units in total before going to your next row.

## Instructions (cont.)

3. Right angle weave a total of 60 rows. You will need to tie off and add new thread multiple times throughout the length of your bracelet. Sixty rows will equal about 6 1/2" long. After approximately the 55th row, start to hold the bracelet against your wrist to see how many rows you want to make in total for a comfortable fit. The clasp is only going to add another $1 / 4^{\prime \prime}$ to the length. You may need to adjust the row amount. When you are finished, tie off your thread and incorporate it into your bead weaving.
4. Cut, condition, and thread a needle onto a 4-foot length of Nymo nylon beading thread. String onto it one Swarovski 8 mm round pearl. Around the circumference of the pearl, brick stitch a row of size 11/0 Czech seed beads in light gold supra metallic. Next, brick stitch a row of 11/0 Czech seed beads in antique cream pearl, and another row of $11 / 0$ Czech seed beads in light gold supra metallic. Tie off your thread and weave it back into your beadwork. Repeat this entire step with a second Swarovski 8 mm round pearl.
5. Repeat the above step to complete a third unit of brick stitching around a pearl. When you finish the third row, do not tie off your thread. Using Swarovski 3 mm round pearls and size 11/0 Czech seed beads in light gold supra metallic, create a decorative beaded edge on the unit you just completed with brick stitching around the 8 mm pearl.
6. Look at the photo of the project for placement of these three beaded "buttons". The one with the decorative edge is in the very middle of the bracelet. On each end of the bracelet, there is one of the "plainer" buttons. All three are going to be sewn in place. To do so, cut, condition, and thread a needle onto a 2 -foot length of Nymo thread.
7. Starting with the middle button. Take your needle and go from the back of your bracelet to the front. At the exact center of your bracelet, pull your threaded needle through the bracelet center. Pull until you have an 8" tail remaining on the backside and the rest of the thread and the needle on the front side. Now, thread your needle through one of the Czech seed beads in light gold supra metallic, which is part of the first brick stitched row around the 8 mm pearl in the button with the decorative edge.

## Instructions (cont.)

8. Pull this button so that it lays tightly against the right angle woven beads of your bracelet making sure not to pull that 8" tail out of the back. Now, sew through one of the beads in your bracelet and then back up through another bead in that first brick stitched row of the button. Try to sew in and out of the beads themselves vs. the threads connecting them. Also, try to hide your stitching as much as possible. Make sure to secure the button on opposite sides, not just one section but sections across from each other. Once you have made several passes through, gently tug on the button to see how secure it is. When you feel like it is securely sewn onto the beadwork below it, tie off your thread. Go back and incorporate that 8" tail into your bead weaving and tie it off.
9. Repeat the above step with your two "plainer" buttons - one on each end of the bracelet. One of these buttons is going to act as half of our clasp.
10. We have to make the loop that is going to slip around one of the above side buttons. To make this beaded loop, begin by cutting, conditioning, and threading a needle onto 2 feet of Nymo thread.
11. Choose the side of the bracelet where you want to have the loop be connected to. On this side, weave your needle and thread into the beadwork two rows back from the edge, leaving a tail of 8 ". Work your thread in and out of the beads until you arrive at the outer edge and your needle is exiting the edge bead of the third unit, going towards the center of the bracelet. String onto it one size $11 / 0 \mathrm{Czech}$ seed bead in antique cream pearl and 1 size $11 / 0$ Czech seed bead in light gold supra metallic. String one Swarovski 3mm round pearl. Next, string one size 11/0 Czech seed bead in light gold supra metallic, one size 11/0 Czech seed bead in antique cream pearl until you end up with a total of 33 beads after the pearl, alternating between gold and cream. Your last bead should be a gold one.
12. Now, pass your needle through the Swarovski 3 mm pearl, and pull tightly to create a loop. Make sure your thread is tight and that loop is resting on the edge of your bracelet. String one size 11/0 Czech seed bead in light gold supra metallic and one size 11/0 Czech seed bead in antique cream pearl. Pass your needle now through the bead on the edge of your bracelet. Weave your thread in and out of the beads along the first two rows of your bracelet.
13. Tie off your thread and incorporate the tail into the bead weaving. Go back to that 8 " tail you left when you started the loop and tie off and incorporate it back into your bead weaving. And you're all done!

# Entwined Pearl and Petal Bracelet 

By Beejang from Bead Tutorial

This Entwined Pearl and Petal Bracelet is truly a stunning jewelry project to add to your collection. Simple and elegant, this DIY bracelet is the epitome of what pearls stand for.


## Materials

Swarovski Bicone Crystal 4mm (I use It. Peach and Padparadscha)

Swarovski Bicone Crysal 3mm (I use Lt. Rose)

Swarovski Pearl 6mm (Rosaline or Cream)

Seed Beads

Nylon Thread
O-Ring
Clasp
Crimp Bead
Bead Tip
Pliers

## Instructions

1. You will want to start with the crimp bead and the bead tip. Start by adding three seed beads to each thread. Then, cross the threads at Padparadscha crystal, (or Peach crystal), which is where the red arrow is.


## Instructions (cont.)

2. Next you will want to add one crystal to each thread. Then, you will want to cross them at a crystal, which is pointed to by the red arrow.
3. Add a three millimeter crystal to each thread. Then, cross them at a seed bead, which is represented by the blue arrow.

4. Next, add a three millimeter crystal to each thread, which is represented by the red arrows.
5. From there, put the threads into the first four millimeter crystal, which is represented by the blue arrow.

6. Then, you will want to return the threads to the last four millimeter crystal, which is represented by the red arrow. You will complete this by putting them into the four millimeter crystals at both sides.


## Instructions (cont.)

7. Add three Lt. Peach crystals to one thread (or if you had previously used the Peach beads, add three Padparadscha). Then, add one pearl to thread as well, and join them at a crystal, which si represented by the red arrow.

8. Repeat Steps two through five until you reach your desired length. When you are completing step five for each repetition, be sure to switch crystals and pearls from the previous block.
9. Be sure to finish off your bracelet by adding three seed beads when you end your bracelet.


# Alluring Multistrand <br> DIY Bracelet

This is definitely a twist on a classic pearl DIY jewelry piece. This Alluring Multistrand DIY Bracelet is perfect for adding an edgy aspect to your classy pearl look!


## Materials

## Czech glass beads

Faux pearl beads
Crimp beads
Round beads

Beading Wire
Pliers
Bead Caps
Clasp
Wire cutters

## Instructions

1. Cut four strands of beading wire using your wire cutters.
2. On each wire string your different types of bead on each strand (i.e. make one strand of just faux pearl beads, one strand of just Czech glass beads, one strand of just crimp beads, and one strand of just round beads).
TIP: Use scotch tape to secure one end of the beading wire while you are stringing, this will make the strands easier to work with later.
3. Once you have all your beads strung on your beading wire, gather the open ends together and string on a bead cap.

## Instructions (cont.)

4. Next, string on a crimp bead and one end of a toggle clasp.
5. Wrap the wire ends around and back through the crimp bead. Use needle nose pliers to crimp the crimp bead flat in order to secure the clasp
6. Use wire cutters to trim off any extra wire tails
7. Now, arrange your lengths of beads to the size of your wrist. Once you have the proper length you would like your bracelet, string the other bead cap onto the other end of the wires.
8. Repeat the crimping process again for the other side of your toggle clasp
9. Once you have crimped all the wires into place, you have your DIY bracelet all set and ready to go!

## Snaking Pearl <br> Bracelet

## By Kirsten from Wild Amor

This Snaking Pearl Bracelet is undeniably unique and stunning. This is a wrap bracelet that is far different from any other. Plus, it is perfect for wearing with all different kinds of outfits!


## Materials

An assortment of pearls in different sizes (the largest size used is 2 XXL )

Seed beads
Scissors

Craft wire (24-28 gauge, depending on the hole size of your pearls)

Jewelry clasp (optional)

3-in-1 jewelry pliers

## Instructions

1. Start with the largest size of your pearl beads. Begin adding pearls directly onto the jewelry wire you are using.
2. While you string the pearls onto your wire, be sure to alternate between your pearls and your seed beads. Do not cut the wire yet.
3. Continue to adding pearls with the second largest sized pearls. Add approximately four inches of this size of pearls.
4. Continue adding pearls of the next size down. Add approximately eight inches off this pearl, and remember to continue alternating between pearls and seed beads.

## Instructions (cont.)

5. Finally, add the pearls that are the smallest size. Add approximately nine inches worth of these sized pearls, and end on a pearl not a seed bead.
6. While it is straightened the bracelet should be about 24 inches long. You can make the bracelet longer or shorter if you like. Remember you are going to begin wrapping the bracelet around your hand and it will not stay straight.
7. At the end of your bracelet create a loop with your pliers. Twist the wire to create a spiral, which will form a "stopper."
8. At the opposite end of your bracelet, where the largest pearls are, cut the wire about 1.5 inches away from your starting pearl. Repeat step 7.
9. Add a jump ring and a jewelry clasp to the end of your bracelet where the biggest pearl is.
10. Wrap the bracelet around your hand, and use the jewelry clasp to hook onto any point in your bracelet so it stays in place. Continue to play around with it until it feels comfortable.

## Deep Sea Pearl DIY Earrings

These Deep Sea Pearl DIY Earrings are insanely stunning. Not only are you going to feel like a mermaid goddess every time you put these pearl earrings on, but they are also perfect for pairing with your favorite t-shirt and jeans!


## Materials

2-9mm Irregular Potato Pearl Beads
2-14mm Copper Pewter Oval Beads
2-52mm Copper Headpins
2 Antiqued Copper Finish Earring Wires

2-4mm coordinated jump rings
Round nose pliers
Chain nose pliers
Flush cutters

## Instructions

1. First, slip the pearl bead inside the center of the copper bead, aligning the holes. Stack the two beads onto a decorative head pin.
2. Next, grip the head pin above the bead with your round nose pliers. Form a loop by wrapping the wire end of the pin around one side of the pliers.
3. Then, wrap the wire end around the pin between the loop and the top of the bead in neat coils.
4. Trim any excess wire away with flush cutters, and press the trimmed end down with pliers if necessary.
5. Finally, twist open a small jump ring, and connect the earring wire to the beads through the loops on each side. Close the jump ring, and repeat with the other earring!

# Something Blue Earrings 

## By Jennifer from Prima Bead

These are simple DIY earrings with gorgeous multi-colored pearl beads. These Something Blue Earrings are perfect for weddings and formal events, and they will keep you looking beautiful every time you wear them!

## Materials

1 pk \#34718051 Oval Chain Copper
1 pk \#3202301 50' .5mm Clear Stretch Cord

1 pk \#7120206 50pc 8mm Round Pearl Strand - Ecru

1 pk \#7120228 50pc 8mm Round Pearl Strand - Peach

1 pk \#7120216 50pc 8mm Round Pearl Strand - Turquoise

1 pk \#65024014 20g Copper Wire Brown

## Instructions

1. Cut (3) 2" lengths of wire. Form a loop at one end of each wire, making them into eye pins.
2. Thread on of each color pearl onto a wire and form a loop, making a three bead strand.
3. Connect each link into a chain, starting with Ecru, then Peach, and then Turquoise
4. Cut a 2.5 " length of wire.
5. Using round nose pliers, curve one end of the wire into a loop. Extend the wire past the loop and curve it into an earring wire shape.
6. Trim the wire.
7. Repeat steps 1-6 for the matching earring.

# Bow and Pearls Earrings 

## By Aki from Minted Strawberry

Nothing can beat this Bow and Pearls Earrings pattern. These DIY earrings combine the classy look of pearls with adorable bows to make the ultimate stud earring that your pearl jewelry collection cannot be complete without.


## Materials

Polymer clay
Bow mold
Box Cutter / X-acto Knife
Pearls

## Eyepins

Earring posts with loop hole
E6000 glue
Jewelry Pliers

## Instructions

1. Begin by taking some of your polymer clay and rolling it into a small ball.
2. Press your ball of clay firmly into the bow mold that you have.

Tip: To peel off your bow easily coat your mold in baby powder or water before you press your clay into it.
3. Pop your mold into the freezer for about 10 minutes so that it can harden.
4. Carefully cut off any excess clay using your box cutters. You will want to be sure to do this step while your clay is still cold to keep from changing the shape or details of your bow.

## Instructions (cont.)

5. After you have finished cutting off the excess clay, place your bow back into the same bow mold. Be sure to coat with more water or baby powder if necessary.
6. Push your earring post into the back of your bow mold. Don't worry if the post does not stick into your earring, you can glue it after you complete the baking process.
7. Bake your bows according to the instructions for the polymer clay that you bought.
8. Attach your earring posts to your earrings if they did not stick during the baking process. Simply do this by gluing them on with some E6000 glue.
9. Thread your pearl bead onto an eyepin, butting off the excess wire off and looping the other end to secure the pearl in place.
10. Attach the pearl to your bow by opening the bigger eyepin end, and loop it onto your earring post.

# Wire Winged Pearl Earrings 

## By Gloria from Domestic Diva

These Wire Winged Pearl Earrings really add a pretty twist on your typical pearl earrings. Plus, these DIY earrings are so easy for you to make!


## Materials

16 gauge wire
5 and 7 mm 16 gauge jump rings
Earring wires

Jewelry pliers
Jewelry wire cutters
1.50" round objects (plastic container, can, etc.)

## Instructions

1. Cut a 16 gauge piece of wire to measure approximately 2.50 " long.
2. With your fingers, smooth the wire around a hard 1.50 " round container.
3. Fold the wire in two about .75 " from one end. Using the widest end of round nose pliers, create curls in the wire ends. One should be higher than the other.
4. Cut another length of wire to measure 2 " and curve it to match the previous wire. Create a curl on one end to match the other curls.
5. Slip on a pearl. With the small end of the round nose pliers, make a curl in the top of the wire.
6. Attach a 5 mm jump ring to the small curl in the wire.

## Instructions (cont.)

7. To assemble the earring insert a 7 mm jump ring into the four components in this order: earring wire, 5 mm jump ring, jump ring attached to the pearl wire, and the double curled folded wire.
8. Be sure to wear the earring you assembled in the order above in your left ear.
9. To make the right ear earring, you will assemble your earring in the opposite order. Assemble it in the following order: folded wire, jump ring attached to the double curled and the pearl wire, 5 mm jump ring, and earring wire.
10. Be srue to wear the earring you assembled in the order above in your right ear, and you're all done!


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
